



Facts About PrEP



What is PrEP?

PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) is medicine for people at risk for HIV. PrEP can help prevent HIV transmission from sex or injection drug use. When taken as prescribed, PrEP can reduce risk by more than 70%.

Do I Need to Take PrEP?



Have you had unprotected anal or vaginal sex with a partner and don't know if they have HIV?



Have you been diagnosed with a sexually transmitted infection (STI) in the last six months?



Do you sometimes or rarely use condoms for sex?



Do you use intravenous drugs or have a partner that does?

How Do I Pay for PrEP?

Under the Affordable Care Act, PrEP must be free under almost all health insurance plans. If you don't have insurance, visit [GetYourPrEP.com](https://www.getyourprep.com) to find out how you may be able to get the medication for free or at a reduced cost.
